PLAY TO LEARN PRESCHOOL

Community Helpers - Day 1



Your community is the neighborhood, town, or city that you live in. Lots of people in your community are helpers. Let's learn about the community helpers who keep us safe.

Sing



Sing the song, "The Wheels on the Fire Truck" to the tune of "The Wheels on the Bus." Make up verses for all the parts of a fire truck.

- The **siren** on the truck goes "Wee-Woo, Wee-Woo!"
- The **hose** on the truck goes "Squirt, squirt, squirt!"



Pretend

Use chalk to draw flames on your sidewalk, driveway, or on paper. Fill a water bottle and squirt the flames until they disappear.

Play



Create a town with roads and buildings out of blocks. Use toy cars and pretend to be a community helper, driving around the town and helping people be safe.



Recite



Phone numbers are long, but really important. Ask your grown-up to write down their cell phone number. Use an old phone or a toy phone to practice reciting the number and dialing it. Can you remember all 10 digits?

Practice

You can practice being safe by knowing these important things:

- Can you say your *first name* and your *last name* when someone asks, "What is your name?"
- Can you say your parents' names when someone asks?
- Can you say the name of your street? Your house or apartment number?







Practice



Stretch your strong muscles. Get your heart pumping by running, dancing, and playing. Keep your body strong and healthy every day.





Community Helpers - Day 3



Builders and Fixers are important community helpers who make our roads; build our houses, stores, and hospitals; and fix things that break.

Build



Build a tall building using supplies you already have:


- Gather cardboard from the recycling bin.
- Roll sheets of newspaper into thin rods.
- Tape them together. How tall can you make your structure?

Move



Draw a road with sidewalk chalk. Ride your bike or drive your toy cars and trucks on the road. Move fast. Move slow. Try moving backwards!

Paint



Fill a bucket with water. Use a paintbrush to “paint” the water on the outside of your home. Ask your grown-up where you can play. Maybe you can paint the sidewalk, the fence, the deck, or the patio with the water.

Get Messy



Make this “Cement” with your grown-up. If it’s warm enough, you might do it outside!

Mix 1 cup of cornstarch (corn flour in the UK) with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water. Add a little bit of sand if you have it. Drive your cars and trucks through the “cement.”

Community Helpers - Day 4



Food helpers grow our food, prepare our food, and sell it.

They work on farms, in grocery stores, and at restaurants to provide us with plenty of healthy food.

Wash



Fill your kitchen sink with clean water. Ask your grown-up if you can wash your family's fruits and vegetables. Wipe them gently in the water and put them on a clean towel to dry.

Help



You can be a Food Helper too. Ask what you can do to help prepare your next meal. Maybe you can make a sandwich, fill the glasses with water, or set the table.

Search



Food and farmer start with the letter **F**. Look around your house and find things that also start with the letter **F**.

Pretend



Set up a restaurant at your house. Use a tablecloth and make menus. Write down the orders on a notepad and pretend to be the chef.

Solve



Grown-ups: Cut the front of an empty cereal box into a puzzle. Make big pieces for younger children or smaller pieces for older children. When they assemble the puzzle, they are developing important visual-spatial skills!

Community Helpers - Day 5

Connect
